


Many of you will be able to look back with pride upon your contribution to the celebration of our centennial year, and speak proudly of your participation in this great festival.

Several events have already taken place during the school year to mark this event, and plans are well underway for the final program in the field of music of which we are so justly proud.



SENIOR PRIZE WINNING SPEECH

THE BIBLE AND MODERN SCIENCE

We are living in a day when science is in the forefront of our thinking. Our daily lives are shielded by modern comforts and enriched by material advances which we owe largely to the industry and vision of our scientists. Today scientists are thought to be cold, hard, and atheistic but little credence is given to the fact that many of the greatest scientists in history, and many in our day, have affirmed that an increasing knowledge of scientific truth has strengthened rather than weakened their faith in God. In fact, not so long ago a magazine reporter for a national publication noted that most scientists believe in God. One said, "For me, I prefer the belief in a creator, divine, supernatural. I cannot accept chaos." Another, "We have found laws to prove we can't make mass and energy. Yet it must come from somewhere. There must be a Higher Power who can make it." It was only last November at the First World Congress on Evangelism in Berlin that Dr. Hans Rohrback, the President of Mainz University in Germany stated, and I quote, "radical theologians are basing current speculations on outmoded scientific thought." Thus, the purpose of this essay is to clearly lay before you my position in regards to the supposed battle between the Bible and Modern Science.

I would now like to present some of many interesting points which have together confirmed my belief that the bible and Modern Science can exist together in this world without conflict. Did you know that there is a vast expanse in the northern heavens where even our most powerful telescopes cannot detect a single star? Thousands of years ago, the author of Job, an early Old Testament book wrote down this remarkable fact and only in the past one hundred years has science found this out. Did you know that thousands of years ago, Isaiah, Jeremiah, and other Old Testament writers declared that the earth was round, and poised in space, that the moon didn't shine, and that the stars could not be numbered? And this to the jeers and ridicule of scientists living in their day and even of Sixteenth Century scientists. WHO taught Job the

science of astronomy?

This leads me on to another subject which undeservedly has alarmed many who have put their faith in the Scriptures -- The Theory of Evolution. The unfortunate part of this whole matter is that many professors, lacking in personal honesty or in intestinal fortitude. teach the theory as an established fact. It is nothing of the sort! Far from forming a phalanx of agreement, the truth is that scientists widely differ at every point in the theory. Indeed, even fifty years ago the evolutionists were quite mixed up. In answer to the question, "How did man come?", two eminent scientists, Professor J. A. Thompson and Patrick Geddes, who were championing the cause of evolution most ex-plicitly stated, "We do not know whence he emerged, nor do we know how man arose . . . for it must be admitted that the factors of the evolution of man partake largely of the nature of maybe's which have no permanent position in science." What a pitiable confession!

No less an authority than the late scientific genius, Lord Kelvin, who at eleven years of age attended Glasgow University, said the following, "Was there anything so absurd as to believe that a number of atoms, by falling together of their own accord, could make a sprig of moss, a microbe, a living snimal?"

It is amazing that evolutionists think a Christian is gullible to believe in God but do not think themselves gullible for believing in evolution which says, "Out of the primordial ooze and over millions of centuries there came the union of elements that made a complex molecule which could reproduce itself and be called alive." The odds against this happening by chance, if it had to happen all at once, have been estimated as something of the order of 10 to the 72nd power. I, as a human being with the powers of rationalization that I have been given, cannot possibly believe in evolution and all its atheistic tendencies when these are placed against the formidable, and for me overwhelming evidence in favour of the infallibility of the Bible and the existence of God.

confederation did take place. The erritories seemed to be separated by perriers. A journalist of that time wrote: "We are shut off from each ther geographically, commercially, politically, and socially, Our interests are not identical, but the very opposite." He spoke the truth! The Maritimes were separated from Canada by the New Brunswick highlands, Canada from Red River by forests, Red River from Pacific coast by the mountains, and also they differed in customs. Ideas and customs prevalent in some parts were not so in others. These barriers seemed insurmountable, but with the passing of time and combined interests, men like J. A. MacDonald proved this division to be false.

On July 1, 1867, four provinces, Quebec, Ontario, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick joined to form a dominion. Soon others followed, Today, Canada consists of ten provinces. Each, to commemorate the birth, is building a monument to honour one of the Fathers of Confederation. The Nova Scotian government has just finished construction on a medical school on the Dalhousie University campus in Halifax. They are paying tribute to Sir Charles Tupper, a doctor-politician.

Quebec, or in truth, Montreal, is paying perhaps the greatest tribute to our founders. The latter is making our country known. She has managed to secure the World's Fair for the centennial year, thus ensuring wider exposure of Canada. Our economy will rise with the certain influx of visitors who, in the future, will regard Canada as a land of many beautiful scenes rather than a land blanketed in perpetual cold.

Centennial year serves a dual purpose which we must remember in the midst of our celebration. Centennial year marks the birth of our nation and should, as well, remind all Canadians that the desire of the founders was to have a land united in area and in spirit.
